

Spotlight on the Board

Second in a series

Bill Petrarca

Bill Petrarca, a recent president of UUCFM and universally recognized as the go-to guy to get things done, saved the day for us by putting a mention in INDEED that we were looking for a UU minister. How remarkable that a UU minister residing in Costa Rica would take a look at that notice! The rest, as they say, is history. As remarkable as Bill's professional achievements are, what is even more significant is that much of his work has been centered in philosophical thought, particularly the work of Henry Nelson Wieman, an American philosopher and theologian.

Bill grew up in Akron, Ohio, in a close-knit neighborhood where the kids played together, and everyone knew everyone else. He remembers Monopoly games that went on for days. The board sat on the porch night and day and games lasted for so long that the kids had to manufacture their own bills because those that came with the game ran out. So long, in fact, that they created bills for half a million dollars out of paper bags. The stakes were high!

One characteristic of this Italian, Catholic community was its warm welcome to immigrants. Bill recalls how neighbors and family sponsored and provided for immigrants from Italy as they were assimilated into the community. He also remembers fondly the support of the neighbors and extended family when his father died. The procession of cars exceeded 200.

Bill's career shows widespread interests and a broad spectrum of talents. It is hard to keep up with all he has done. He started out at Bell Labs in New Jersey working on anti-ballistic missiles; he got into computers just as this field was taking off. Programmers were in demand but since colleges and universities were just developing curricula, he became computer literate and sometimes found himself in the position of translator between the nerds and us regular folk. Back in Ohio, he got a job with NASA developing a safety database after the tragic fire in the Apollo 1 Command Module which killed three astronauts. He then went into banking just as it was automating and was in on the first ATM. He became a strategic manager, but the laws in those days prohibited banks from having branches. They could only expand by buying up adjacent property. So, having gone as far as possible at the bank, Bill turned to consulting.

Bill and his wife, Jane Strathman, began their own consulting firm, SAI, in Columbus, Ohio. They found an area where there is high demand, and which continued to operate even after they retired to Fort Myers. Their mission was to teach communication skills. Major clients were Microsoft and a large health care chain.

Wieman's ideas appealed to an empirically oriented person like math-major Bill. Wieman, who eventually became a Unitarian minister, held the view that God or the divine was not a supernatural being but rather the process by which we transform to the greatest good. His thought provides the basis for Peter Mayer's song where we sing "Everything is holy now." Bill had become interested in and subscribed to Wieman's thought before he came to UUCFM. Here he has found a community in harmony with his views. He is dedicated to seeing our principles flourish. As Bill changed and adapted numerous times in his career, he has the exciting idea of helping our community find a fresh, original way of advancing our ideas and values, an idea which makes us curious and very hopeful about the future.


Community Conversations



Transforming Hearts

The Board and Worship Associates of UUCFM are taking a six-session course, facilitated by Mary Cline Golbitz and Cat Pivetti, called Transgender Inclusion in Congregations. The course was developed by the Transforming Hearts Collective. Here is how it is described at the website: This course is for everyone from novices on trans identity to those with decades of life experience. Rather than simply offering a "trans 101," this class pushes participants to the next level of congregational welcome, relationship-building, and skills-building. It counters mainstream narratives about who trans people are; supports understanding of non-binary identities (such as genderqueer, agender, and Two-Spirit); and employs a deeply intersectional approach. Congregational teams are particularly encouraged to participate.

We have purchased this course and intend for it to be made available to the congregation. Participants are learning how to deepen and implement our commitment to inclusion.



Check It Out: Freedom to Read Library!

The Fire Next Time by James Baldwin

We just celebrated the centennial of James Baldwin's birth, so I thought I would read The Fire Next Time, a book you can find and check out in our library. The Fire Next Time consists of two sections, first a letter to his nephew James, who is named for him, and who at fourteen reminds Baldwin of both his father and his brother, the boy's father. The second much longer section concerns Baldwin's struggles to deal with religion and his effort to explain the Black experience to white people and to find a way forward. This book is part essay and part memoir. We learn that as a young person, Baldwin had no idea that he or any other Black person could become a writer. He saw his possible choices as becoming a preacher or becoming a pimp. His invention of a route to succeed through writing is a great gift to American literature.

Baldwin's love for his nephew is mingled with pain as he knows the racism this young man will have to face and how it will attack his self-esteem and limit his choices as he moves through life. Baldwin tells him, "This is the crime of which I accuse my county and my countrymen, and for which neither I nor time not history will ever forgive them, that they have destroyed and are destroying hundreds of thousands of lives and do not know it and do not want to know it." Then, understanding that many readers

will be white, he says he can almost hear them saying, "How bitter you are." He defends himself from this charge and ends his argument by saying, "We can make America what America must become."

The title of the second part is "Down at the Cross." Baldwin's father was a minister and when James turned 14, he went through a long religious crisis.

Signs of hell were all around him. He judged himself harshly and was consumed by guilt. He became a "young minister" and discovered his own oratorical skills. His sermons were rousing even if his faith did not match his eloquence. As an adult he rejected the religion of his youth. An important part of the second section is his dinner with Nation of Islam leader Elijah Muhammad. By this time, Baldwin had made a name for himself; the Nation of Islam was actively courting him. Baldwin is unwilling to supplant one rigid set of dogma with another. He understands why this group refers to whites as

"devils", but he feels both groups "deeply need each other." He cannot subscribe to a belief system where all whites are villains because he knew 2 or 3 white people whom he could trust.

The title of the book refers to an old hymn in which God give Noah the rainbow but warns that there will not be another flood. "No more water, the fire next time." Since this book was written, we grew proud with hope after the election of Obama. Little did we know that there would be a new surge of racism and that in our own state we would see diversity, equity and inclusion legislated out of our schools. I end with a quote from the book. It gives an idea of how Baldwin sweeps the reader along with the beauty of

his rhetoric. It also seems as relevant now as when it was written in the early sixties. "If we – and now I mean the relatively conscious whites, and the relatively conscious blacks, who must, like lovers, insist on, or create, the consciousness of the others—do not falter in our duty now, we may be able, handful that we are, to end the racial nightmare, and achieve our country, and change the history of the world."
