# **Spotlight on the Board**

First in a series

**Sue Roth - VP Stewardship** 

Sue Roth's mother impressed on her a story from when she was a baby. Her father was going out to buy rolls when something came over the radio that stopped everyone cold. It was the attack on Pearl Harbor. Her father did buy the rolls, but the next day he enlisted in the Navy. She and her mother went to California with him when he shipped out. In San Francisco an officer allayed her mother's fears by saying, "No matter what, we're saving your husband." The officer's words proved true. By the time Sue's father came back little Sue was almost five. Sue still remembers when he threw off his hat and hugged her.

During her childhood, Sue went back and forth from Long Island, where she was born, to the Baltimore area. Her father was in insurance, and her mother, a graduate of the New York Conservatory of Music, sang opera. Sue herself had an outstanding voice when she was young, and she remembers being part of a powerful twosome when she went caroling with her mother at Christmas time. When Sue was 12, her family definitively moved to Long Island.

Her family took her to Sunday School in mainline protestant churches when they lived in the small Maryland town of Lutherville. When a Sunday School teacher told her that if she wasn't a "good girl," she would go to hell, her horrified parents pulled her out of that class. Because her father thought that the

Lutherville public school was a fire trap, they sent her to a Catholic school for four years. It was only after the move that her family decided to give Unitarianism a try.

Sue took to this faith and became active in the Liberal Religious Youth group, eventually becoming the LRY president.

At UUCFM, we think of Sue as half of the power couple Len and Sue. Both were widowed, and they found each other because Len was referred to her as a financial adviser by a mutual friend and fellow member of their UU congregation.

Sue was married for 38 years to an engineer who worked behind the scenes at the Houston Space Center. He was testing director for lunar exercises, so Sue spent a few years in Houston. Once she told a Jewish joke, which she thought was funny, but someone was offended and told her that as a non-Jew she was not to tell Jewish jokes. Her husband was Jewish, and she converted to Judaism. Why? "So I could tell Jewish jokes." Of course.

Sue was busy as a wife and as the mother of her son, Steve, for many years. Still, she always wanted to be a nurse. She went back to school and at 43, she graduated. Her career as a nurse was varied. She got a position as a flow nurse at Suburban Hospital. This means that she

was sent wherever she was needed. "This was a GREAT GREAT education." At the same time, she wanted more experience as a psychiatric nurse, and she worked a second job in the psychiatric unit at Montgomery General Hospital. One of Sue's most obvious attributes is persistence. She went on to become a board certified psychiatric nurse. She learned from her mother to never give up.

Len and Sue maintain a busy lifestyle, going back and forth between here and Maryland. Her main source of fun is sitting around with Len kidding around and doing wordle and the like. She got a card from Len with a Flamingo on roller skates that said, "You make the fun, funner." They have a large extended family with kids, step-kids, grandkids and great grandkids. (I lost count.)

Sue felt at home at UUCFM from the start. "It was and continues to be a very warm, welcoming congregation. I feel that everyone is welcome. It is very important to me that UUCFM grow and thrive."

Here is a little snippet of our conversation.

Marge: Sue, you seem to have a thing for Jewish men.

Sue: Big time.






#### **Futures News**

Jennifer Grant moderated the zoom Town Hall Meeting on Sunday afternoon to provide the congregation an opportunity to ask questions and to offer suggestions and ideas to the Futures committee and to the Strategic Visioning Team. Pati Maier, our congregational Treasurer, presented the following images to clarify our financial situation and the reasons that we have to take action now before we find ourselves unable to meet our financial obligations.

The first pie chart shows where our money comes from. The second shows where our money goes. The areas in red indicate resources that we will use up in a few years if we do not identify new income sources. The committee and the team recognize that using the principal of these resources poses a danger to our financial future. It is for this reason that we have engaged the help of Sacred Places.

There was a lively discussion and at this point all options are on the table from renting what we have to selling part of it to selling all of it and moving. We can be proud that we started this process early enough that we still have an abundance of options. Futures Committee Member Patricia Vivier-Naidl pulled together the many strands of the conversations. Here are her words.

"As we look to the future and what will sustain us as a Community, we need to consider all possible options. On September 12th we will be listening to what members of the larger community of Ft Myers and beyond have to say about possible uses of our Sacred Place. Then we will have a better idea of our future direction, whether to

share, rent, build or sell parts or all of our campus. We need to consider wisely and partner with those who share our vision and values!"



#### A Hispanic American Awareness Month book review:

#### Julián Is a Mermaid

Julián is a Mermaid, a winner of the Stonewall Award, written and illustrated by Jessica Love, is a beautiful and powerful picture book, especially if the adult who is reading it aloud pronounces the Spanish words correctly and allows the written lines and the pictures to tell their own stories.

Julián is on the subway with Abuela when they see a group of women dressed as mermaids. "Julian loves mermaids," and tells Abuela that he is a mermaid. While Abuela is having a bath, Julian finds everything


necessary to dress as a mermaid, even red lipstick and a mermaid tail made from a curtain. When Abuela comes into the room, she says,"Oh." Then she gives Julian a necklace and walks with Julian to the Coney Island Mermaid Parade. She tells Julian, "They are mermaids...Like you, Julian." Julian joins the other mermaids.

Jessica Love tells and paints a story filled with beauty and ambiguity. Julián's probable gender identification with the women dressed as mermaids is not overtly described but left open so that children can feel their way into Julián's dress-up and imagined transformation. Love slides deftly into a blend of real enactment and magical transformation that meets 5-8 year old children where they are developmentally. Many gender-expansive as well as many young cis-gender children find comfort in identification with mermaids and metaphors of transformation. This is a book that different children can connect with in different and magical ways.

The author neither labels nor preaches. The book opens a space for gender-expansive children to be themselves rather than being confronted by questions or expectations. Abuela models love, acceptance, and support without defining the child's experience.

It may be difficult for many adults to avoid questioning or explaining when reading this story aloud. However, if they can let the story and the beautiful illustrations stand on their own, this is a book that can expand the world of both the child and the adult.

Zami: A New Spelling of My Name

#### a biomythography by Audre Lorde

Opening a book can be like finding buried treasure, full of surprises and laden with gems. Zami is such a book. What Audre Lorde calls "biomythography," most of us would call a memoir. Born into a family in Harlem, Audre grew up facing the double challenges of being Black and being gay. Her family of course was well aware of racism, but they left it to their brilliant and sensitive daughter to figure out for herself what lay ahead. When she ran for class president, the nuns informed the students that they were to vote for the best student. The only Black child and by far the best student in the class, Audre was sure she would win. When she came

home heartbroken after her loss, her mother berated her and smacked her around for her stupidity. That is as much help as she got from home in dealing with racism. Being gay, was even more difficult. She left home to fend for herself at the age of seventeen.

Audre comes of age during the 50's and 60's before Roe vs. Wade, and we find out, in a cautionary tale to our own times, what a harrowing experience it was for a young girl with no access to medical services. Audre comes to

define her life by the relationships she forges, lovingly with other lesbians but also in complicated friendships with straight men and women, who cannot understand the oppression she lives with every day. "I remember how being young and Black and gay and lonely felt. . . . .We. . .sweated out our first heartbreaks with no school nor office chums to share that confidence over lunch." Those of us who were around during those years will savor the soundtrack that accompanies the events – "Dance, ballerina, dance." "I found my thrill/On Blueberry Hill"

The honesty of her self-reflections, revealing both her courage and her tender vulnerabilities, will steal your heart: the gorgeous, unpretentious poetry of her sentences will sweep you through her struggles with boring and dangerous work in Stamford, her path toward strength in Mexico, and her forging of community in New York's East Village. Homophobia and racism restricted

her agency in the world and yet she found a way and, against the odds, defined herself on her own terms.


